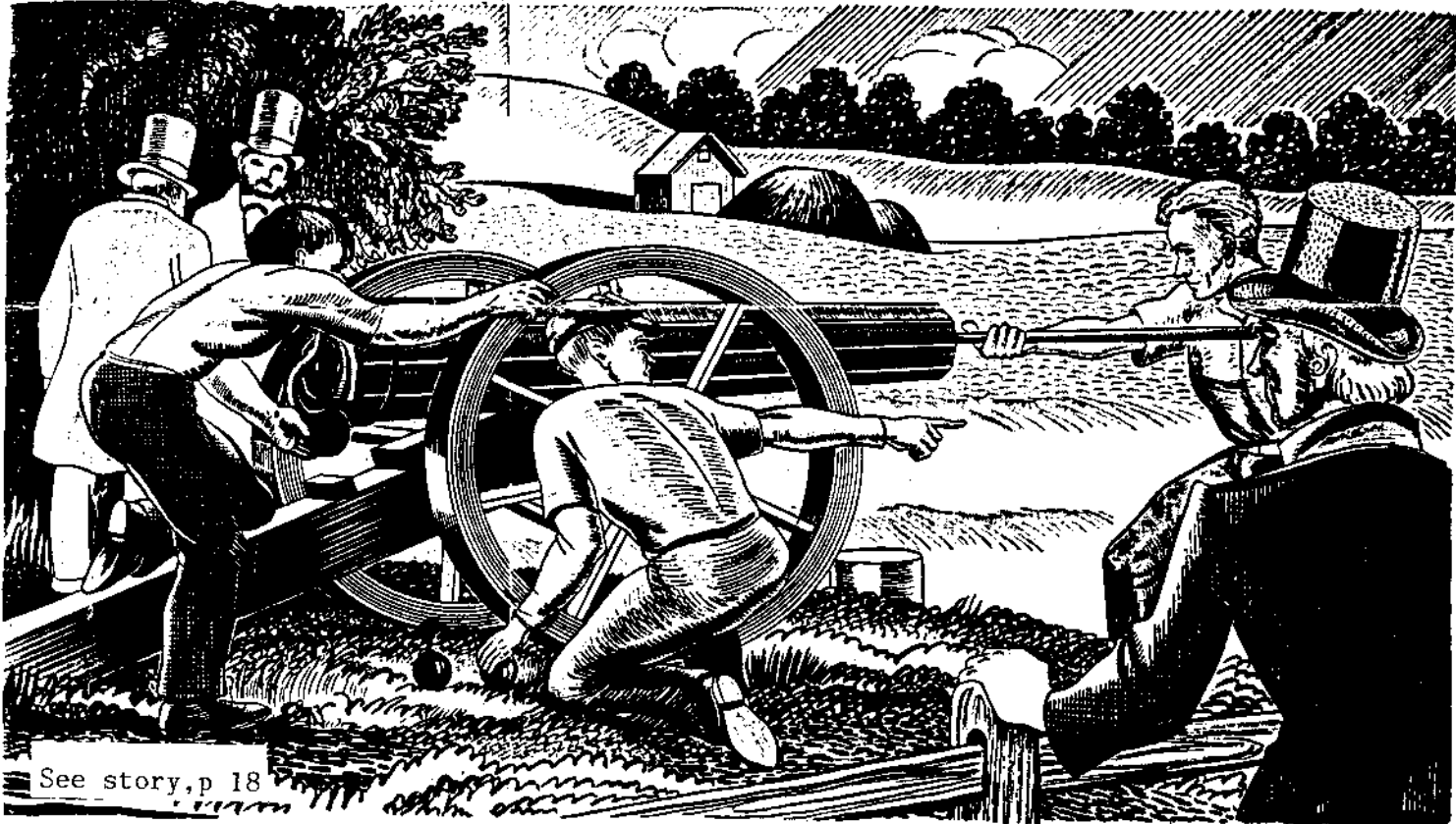

Little Knife or Big Cannon- All Barlows

THE inventive Barlows—four of them—lived in Lexington, Ky. Their ingenuity and mechanical skill ranged all the way from a pocket knife to a locomotive, and although many of their inventions were destined for obscurity, some of them served as foundations for modern improvements.

The first rifled cannon—the granddaddy of the guns now booming away in Europe—was produced by the same Kentucky group of inventors which gave the world the famed Barlow knife.

Thomas H. Barlow, veteran of the War of 1812, led the others in achievements. His brothers, Leason T. and John, and a son, Milton, also tried their hand at invention. All that remains of their original designs is a planetarium constructed by Thomas Barlow, and now a museum piece at Centre College. The planetarium laid the foundation for the study of astronomy; but it was not the first of the inventor's work. He began by building a steamboat model at Augusta in Bracken County. West and Fitch already had launched successful craft, so Barlow turned to the locomotive.

50 cents a ride

In 1827 Lexington residents saw the model locomotive first in operation. The engine drew a small car with two seats and had sufficient power to ascend an elevation of eighty feet to the mile. The contraption was less than four feet high, wheels, boiler and all. It ran on a circular track, and Barlow charged the amazed residents 50 cents each for the rare privilege of riding it. He sold it to Samuel Robb in Fayette County for exhibition purposes, and Robb displayed it in Louisville, Nashville, Memphis, Vicksburg and finally in New Orleans, where a year later it was destroyed by fire.

Barlow built another model for an itinerant showman. But the first model served a most constructive purpose. It was originally exhibited in the machine shop of Joseph Bruen and became the model from which Bruen designed the first locomotive west of the Alleghenies in 1832.

Born in Nicholas County on August 5, 1789, Thomas Barlow was a mechanic before he enlisted in the War of 1812. Under Col. Richard M. Johnson he was appointed military artificer in his regiment. Perhaps his early interest in military mechanisms influenced one of his later inventions. It was the first rifled cannon, patented in 1855. Congress had appropriated \$3,000 for an experimental gun, which was cast in Pittsburgh and sent to Lexington to be rifled and finished. The cannon, which was the forerunner of all rifled cannon of Europe and America, weighed 6,900 pounds and had a bore that



had been fashioned squarish and twisted, making one turn in forty-five feet. The projectile had a squarish cross-section also.

Ten years earlier, in 1845, the same inventor turned out a gadget which was intended only to entertain his grandchildren and to give them a few object lessons concerning the heavenly bodies. It was this rude planetarium that brought most fame to the designer; for it was the first practical means of studying astronomy. In his spare time he built it in the silversmith shop of his son, Milton Barlow. Two years later he designed and built a complete instrument which he sold to Girard College in Philadelphia. In 1851 it was exhibited at the New York World's Fair, after which the United States Government contracted with him to build one for the United States Military Academy at West Point and one for the Naval Academy at Annapolis. Each brought the inventor \$2,000 and orders for similar instruments from colleges and schools throughout the country.

Thomas Barlow's inventions included also an improved machine for cutting nails and a process of preparing hemp. The former mechanism was sold to a manufacturer in Massachusetts and was for many years the principal equipment of nail cutters. The latter process replaced the old method of rotting hemp in dew or cold water. Barlow's method was a simple one by which the hemp was placed in vats through which pipes were run to admit steam. The glutinous substance was drawn out in the steaming process, thus speeding up hemp preparation.

Grandpa carried one

Best known of the Barlow inventions, however, was the Barlow knife, a must in the pocket of every schoolboy of the Nineteenth Century. While the invention has been credited to both Milton and Thomas Barlow, it also has been called the work of Leason Barlow. Records in the United States Patent Office indicate that the latter designed it. It was superior to the cutlery which at that time came mainly from England, and remained a leading seller over a long period.

While Thomas Barlow was at work on his inventions, his son, Milton, although a silversmith by trade, turned out a number of small articles before he finally turned his attention to constructing an improved cradling harvester. That was in 1856, about the time of the Dearing and McCormick inventions along the same line. There was a veritable flood of such inventions, many of them involving court actions and wrangles of various sorts. The complicated affair turned out by Barlow apparently became lost in the mix-ups and the keen competition of the times.

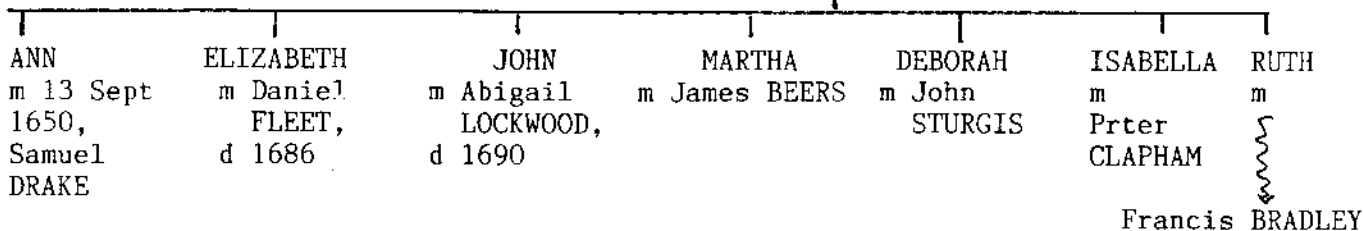
Only fragmentary accounts remain to tell the story of the Barlows, and little mention is made of the role of John Barlow, brother of Thomas and Leason. Although he had a part in some of the inventions, he is best remembered as a pioneer of the West. He it was who built the first highway over the Blue Mountains in Oregon in the 1840s, opening the way for settlements in the region across the mountains. The highway covered a distance of about 100 miles.

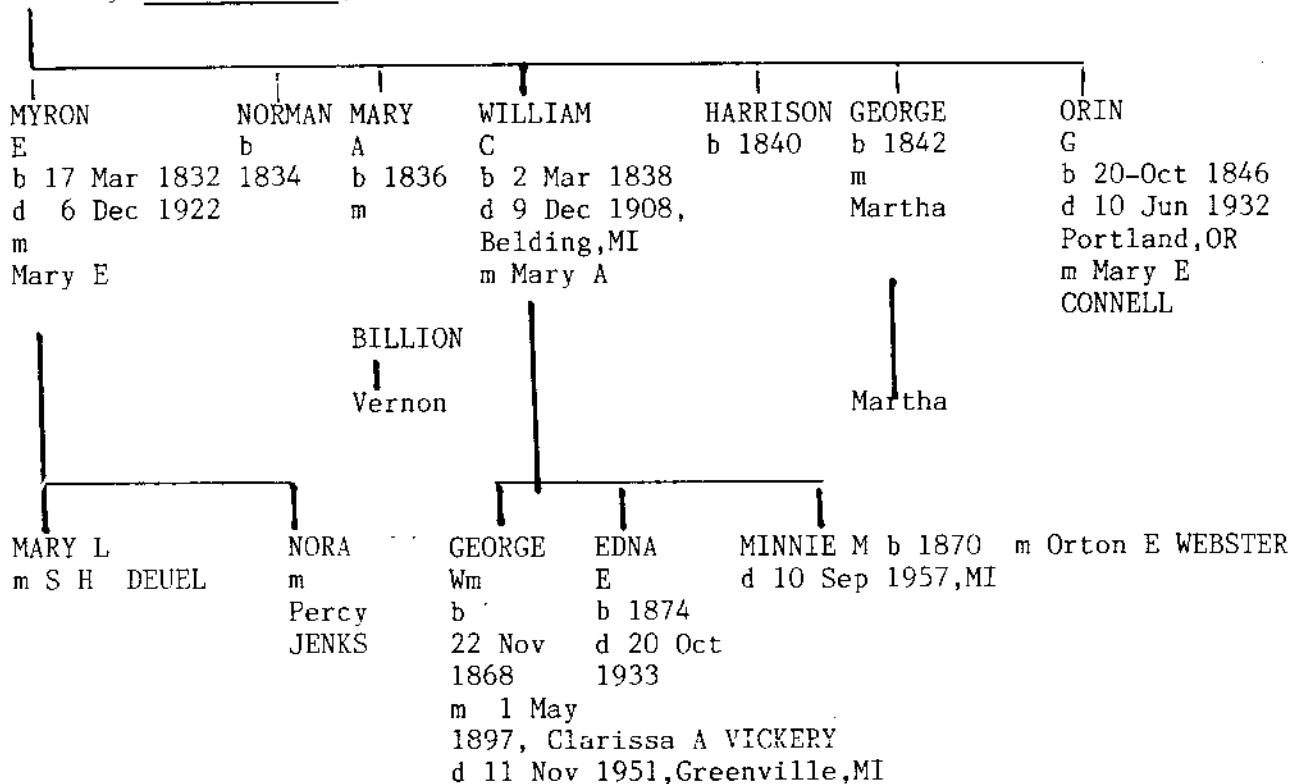

Note: 1881-1882. Information as to the identity or differentiation of one or two: George Barlow, living consecutively in Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts, from 1637 to 1834, is submitted to the readers of this column. I shall omit the citations of authority to save space, premising that all statements are based on contemporary records.

George Barlow in 1637 was convicted in a Massachusetts court of idleness. He or another signed the "combination" 1689 at Exeter and had grants of land there 1641 and 1650. He is mentioned as of Exeter in 1647-8-9, and appears as plaintiff or defendant in the old Norfolk County courts, 1644-6-8, including one case of slander in which he was sued. This is to be referred to later. The last appearance of this George Barlow was in New Hampshire in 1650, when he was granted a saw mill privilege. In 1653 a George Barlow had become a resident of Saco, Maine, signed the submission to the Massachusetts Government same year, and later in year was prohibited "any more publicly to preach or prophecy." This is the last heard of him in Maine. In 1657, a George Barlow took the oath of fidelity at Sandwich, Cape Cod, and was appointed "Marshall" of the town. His services were largely directed against the Quakers, and for several years his activities in this line aroused bitter resentments. A number sued him for false imprisonment, cruel treatment, etc., and one victim in 1690 "affirmed that George Barlow stands convicted of a lye at Newbury." This seems to place the seal of identity on the George Barlow sued and convicted of slanders in 1644 in the Norfolk County courts and the Sandwich George Barlow. There is, however, a
