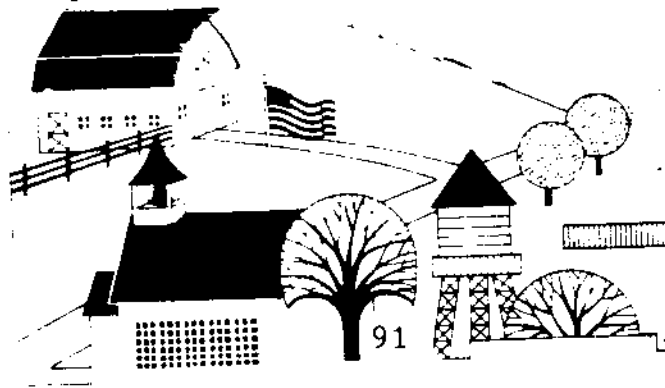

Barlows in Seventeenth Century New England

compiled by Edson L. Barlow

ABIGAIL (BARLOW) DUNHAM of Plymouth, Massachusetts

Abigail Barlow, a daughter of Thomas Barlow, married John Dunham on October 22, 1622, at Leiden in the Netherlands.¹ John Dunham was a Leiden Separatist who stayed in Holland when the *Mayflower* left for New England. He came to Plymouth, Massachusetts, between 1628 and 1632 with Abigail, who was his second wife, and three children from his first marriage.

AUDREY (BARLOW) ALMY of Sandwich, Massachusetts

Audrey Barlow of Lutterworth, Leicestershire, England, married William Almy of South Kilworth in 1626 at Lutterworth.² William came to New England first by himself sometime before 1631 when he was recorded at Lynn, Massachusetts. He returned to England around 1634 and came back to Massachusetts with his wife Audrey and their children on the *Abigail* in 1635. In 1637 the Almys were one of the first ten families to settle the town of Sandwich, Massachusetts, where they remained only four years. In 1642 they moved to Portsmouth, Rhode Island.

BARTHOLOMEW BARLOW of Boston, Massachusetts

Bartholomew Barlow's arrival in Boston is not recorded. A cooper, he is first on record in 1648 but is believed to have owned land for sometime before that. Bartholomew bought more land in Boston in January, 1653.³

Bartholomew Barlow died September 26, 1657, in Boston and his will gave his estate to his son Thomas; there was no mention of a wife or other children. The inventory taken October 12, 1657, included a house, shops and wharf, cooper's tools, household goods and personal property, all totaling some £310.

Thomas Barlow, Bartholomew's son, was born before 1634, probably around 1630. He married around 1656 an Elizabeth. Her children called Joseph Royall "uncle", so she may have been his sister or sister-in-law. Thomas and Elizabeth had two children, both born in Boston.⁴

Elizabeth Barlow, born November 13, 1657, and died April 17, 1660.

Sarah Barlow, born July 18, 1659, and died unmarried around April, 1678.

Thomas Barlow died at Boston on October 23, 1661. His widow Elizabeth subsequently married John Coombs (or Combes) in 1662, and after John's death in 1668, she married John Warren.

EDMUND BARLOW of Malden, Massachusetts

There is no record of Edmund Barlow's arrival in New England. He married Mary Pemberton, the daughter of James and Alice Pemberton, about 1650 in Charlestown, Massachusetts, and he was recorded in Charlestown prior to November, 1664. Edmund is believed to be the son of James Barlow of Turton, England, and consequently was of the Lancashire line of Barlows.⁶ Edmund was baptized October 1, 1626, at Turton.

Edmund and Mary Barlow had seven children, all believed to have been born in either Charlestown or Malden:

Edmund Barlow, died in Surinam, South America, in 1695.

Thomas Barlow, see below.

James Barlow, see below.

Mary Barlow, born in 1652, married October 30, 1674, John Chadwick (1651-1707), son of John and Joan Chadwick, at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Sarah Barlow, married Thomas Grover.

Elizabeth Barlow, married September 19, 1686, James Whiting at Malden.

Deborah Barlow, born in 1676, married around 1694, James Hovey (1674-1765), son of James and Priscilla (Dane) Hovey, at Malden. Deborah died May 15, 1749, at Mansfield, Connecticut.

Edmund Barlow died December 19, 1697, probably at Malden. His will, dated May 16, 1696, was proved December 24, 1697.

Thomas Barlow, the second son of Edmund and Mary Barlow, married October 29, 1681, Elizabeth Mellins, daughter of Richard and Elizabeth Mellins, at Charlestown.⁵ Thomas and Elizabeth may have had more children, but only two were listed as grandchildren in Edmund's will:

Elizabeth Barlow, born September 19, 1686, at Charlestown, married September 5, 1706, Benjamin Hurd (1678-1750), son of Jacob and Anna (Wilson) Hurd, at Charlestown.

Mary Barlow, born 1690, married May 27, 1708, Francis Moore at Boston, Massachusetts.

Thomas Barlow died in 1691 in Barbadoes in the West Indies and his widow Elizabeth subsequently married Samuel Townsend on March 15, 1693. She died November 20, 1699, at Malden.

James Barlow, the third son of Edmund and Mary Barlow, was born in 1659 at Malden. He took the Oath of Allegiance at Hadley, Massachusetts, on February 8, 1678, and was granted fifty acres of land at Suffield on August 10, 1680. At that time Suffield was in Massachusetts; when the border was later re-established, Suffield was in Connecticut.

James Barlow married January 10, 1687, Sarah Huxley, daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Spencer) Huxley, at Suffield, and they had one child:⁵

James Barlow (2nd), see below.

James Barlow (1st) died March 16, 1689/90, at Suffield and his widow subsequently married Ebenezer Smith, son of Samuel Smith, around 1693. After Ebenezer Smith's death, Sarah married October 5, 1732, Martin Kellogg of Suffield. She died in 1722.

EDMUND BARLOW of Malden, Massachusetts (continued)

James Barlow (2nd) married twice and had a large family. He married first April 1, 1714, Mary Harmon, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Skinner) Harmon, at Suffield and they had nine children. In 1747, James Barlow (2nd) and his family moved to Bedford, a small town that later became Granville, Massachusetts. Mary (Harmon) Barlow died at Granville on January 1, 1752.

James Barlow (2nd) married second October 17, 1753, Mary White at Granville and had two more children. James Barlow (2nd) died on August 28, 1758, at Granville.

GEORGE BARLOW of Exeter, New Hampshire

The first record of George Barlow in New England was on September 19, 1637, when he was before the General Court of the Massachusetts Bay Colony and was whipped for idleness.⁷ There is no record of either his arrival in New England or of the date and place of his birth. He is believed to be the son of William Barlow (c.1540-1625) of Pembrokeshire, Wales, an eminent mathematician, and the grandson of William Barlow (c.1500-1568), Bishop of the Cathedral of Chichester, England.⁸

During the winter of 1636-7, the Rev. John Wheelwright (c.1593-1677) had been banished from the Massachusetts Bay Colony for his contrary religious views. He and his followers made their way north and settled the town of Exeter on the Squamscott River southwest of Portsmouth. George Barlow was one of the followers of Wheelwright and one of the thirty-five men who, on October 4, 1639, signed the *Combination* that formed the government of Exeter.⁹ Although Exeter is now in New Hampshire, it was then new territory and out of the jurisdiction of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

Of the signers of the 1639 *Combination*, George Barlow and ten others did not receive land in the first distribution that was ordered in that year. In an analysis of this distribution, it has been suggested that land was distributed only to married men and then in proportion to family size.¹⁰ If this analysis is correct, George Barlow apparently married in 1647 because in that year he received a grant of forty acres. In 1650 he received an additional four acres which may indicate the birth of a child. His wife's name was Cicely but no further particulars of this marriage are known. There is no record of any children, but an Elizabeth Barlow married Henry Hatherly on July 4, 1671, at Saco, a time and place that would be correct for a daughter of George Barlow. Mr. Hatherly was a resident of Wells from 1641 to 1677.

George Barlow took the Freeman's Oath in Exeter in 1648 and in 1649-50 he and others were given permission to set up a sawmill at the falls on the Lamprey River. In 1649 his wife "Sysley" was fined for not appearing as a witness.

In 1642 the inhabitants of Exeter petitioned to become part of Massachusetts and were readily admitted.¹¹ The Rev. Wheelwright, who was still under the sentence of banishment, moved on north and settled at

Wells. George Barlow followed several years later, in 1652, but he and fifteen others finally signed their submission to the government of Massachusetts on July 5, 1653.¹²

George Barlow was said to have been a preacher at Exeter. He preached at Saco in 1653 but his style was so disliked by the Massachusetts authorities that he was forbidden to preach under penalty of ten pounds for each offence.¹²

George Barlow does not appear in the records after 1653. He apparently died in Scarborough sometime before 1665. His widow Cicely subsequently married Henry Watts and they are said to have improved George Barlow's farm which they sold on May 20, 1670. Henry Watts died around 1697 and Cicely is believed to have preceded him as she is not mentioned in the administration of his estate.⁷

GEORGE BARLOW of Sandwich, Massachusetts

George Barlow arrived in Sandwich, Massachusetts, around 1657 with no wife and as many as seven children.¹³ Nothing is definitely known of his origins although a number of possibilities have been proposed. Many writers, notably Hawkins and DeVries,⁸ have stated that this George Barlow and the George Barlow of Exeter, New Hampshire, are the same. Another genealogist, Claude W. Barlow,¹⁴ has stated that this George Barlow came from England to Plymouth Colony sometime before 1657 and that he "had two young sons whose mother may have died in England."

George Barlow took the Oath of Fidelity at Sandwich in 1657. On June 1, 1658, the previous constable of Sandwich, William Bassett, had completed his year's service. He was replaced by George Barlow as constable of Sandwich and special marshall for Sandwich, Barnstable and Yarmouth. His duties were those of jailer, the administration of punishments and the collection of fines and fees.

The authorities of Massachusetts were determined to keep their territory free of Quakers. At first the Quakers were merely banished, but when this didn't work the oppressions became harsher and harsher. In Sandwich, where the majority of the residents were disposed to accept the Quakers, George Barlow pursued his duties with uncommon zeal. These duties included the right to appraise property, choose the goods to be taken in forfeiture and to receive all fees and fines, with ten percent for himself. As the history of Sandwich puts it, "Sandwich thereby went abruptly from a democratic town run by its own citizens, to a little police state run by a stranger with wide powers, who turned out to be a nasty and drunken man as well."¹³ Interestingly, no ill-feelings were held against his descendents, some of whom even married into Quaker families. The actions taken against the Quakers were brought to an end late in 1661 by a decree issued by King Charles.

Nothing is known of George Barlow's first wife. She has been given as Mary Vincent Stetson, daughter of Vincent Stetson, of Milford.⁸ How-

I just received from Yates Publishing Co., a copy of a BARLOW family group sheet belonging to you.

My Great Great Grandparents Benjamin Franklin and Martha Elizabeth Walker Barlow can come from KY to IL in 1849. First to Farmington, Fulton Co., IL and then 1860 to Fishhook, Fairmount twp., IL. which borders Brown Co. IL.

They both were deceased before their children reached adulthood. The only reference I have ever been able to find about where in KY they came from was a mention of Robinson Co., KY. There is no Robinson Co. and never has been, so I therefore think perhaps it should be Robertson Co., which was once part of Nicholas Co. and next to Harrison Co.

Since it looks as though your family settled in Brown Co. I am hoping there might be a connection.

Mr. Coppage I would greatly appreciate hearing from you whether or not you think there could be any family connection. I've enclosed a copy of my BARLOW family group sheet, an Ancestry Chart, and a return envelope. I would appreciate hearing from you either way.
